

Happy New Year! In our culture getting to that New Year's party can be important. The new year is greeted all over the world with bells, whistles, fireworks and of course kisses. In nature the new year slips in quietly. If you step outside on a cold, winter's night you will notice a stillness and deliberation to life. Perhaps you may hear an owl call or a coyote howl greetings across a field, but more likely you will hear only the wind through the branches.

To appreciate nature in winter requires an attention to detail. Stripped away are the bright colors and frivolous activity of the warmer months. Now extra time spent wandering in search for food may be the difference between life and death. A chipmunk awakened too soon from its winter torpor will waste so much energy it may not see the spring. Those hardy animals active during the winter, you and I included, have a purpose

for most wanderings. Follow a set of tracks in the snow and you will see a story of that animal's day. The rabbit moved from cover to cover, leaving tell-tale scats along its path, until it reached its cover for the rest of the day. The wing marks next to the cover shows that the Great-Horned Owl was watching the rabbit silently above. As the snow wanes you can mark the height of the winter's snow cover by noting the deer nibblings on the bark and twigs. No matter your attitude to winter I challenge you to bundle up, put on those boots, or better yet skis or snowshoes, and take a winter hike. Go slowly enough to see and hear the wonders of winter. Bring a camera to capture the beauty of a seed head topped with snowflakes. Or binoculars to observe the tumbling joy of a chickadee flock as they move from feeding area to feeding area. Bring a thermos of your favorite warm drink to enjoy as the sun sinks for the day, spilling its fleeting color over the seemingly barren landscape. When you get home enjoy the heat summer grew for you in your winter firewood.

Thirteen year old Tali from Clinton, WI, writes:

I reached down through the cool water and seized the wiggling crayfish; it flipped its tail at me and snapped its claws menacingly— well, in a way that was meant to be menacing. It's hard to look scary when you're being held by something a few thousand times bigger than you are. I waded to shore and put the crayfish in a tin. A ground squirrel looked up from where it was burying a walnut and a bird chirped in a nearby tree. A hawk was circling lazily, probably looking for its next meal. The Welty Center is a great place to look for many types of plants and animals. I have been going there for many, many years.

Welty is beautiful in all seasons, and you can always see something interesting. In the spring many different birds come to nest and live by Welty, including the great blue heron, cedar waxwings and bluebirds. In the summer Welty hosts many different programs about how nature and humans can co-exist. At survival camp we learned about coexisting with nature; for instance, we built shelters out of natural material and made homemade fishing poles. In the fall Welty hosts a fall festival with scarecrow making, pumpkin carving and nature walks. In the winter there are bonfires and we track animals by following their trails through the snow. Even when I got to be too old for some of the programs I could still participate by volunteering to help with the younger children, which was just as much fun. I saw everything in a new and wonderful way!

Who's Partying in Your Backyard?

Who is partying in your back yard while you are sleeping? Well, maybe "party" isn't the correct term: it is a jungle out there, you know! Your yard is the scene of far more wildlife activity than you may think. Winter is a wonderfully fun time to find out who is foraging, hunting, cavorting, or just passing through your property, and snow reveals all. In summer you may see a deer track in your garden, or a muddy 'coon track on your deck; snow will tell you of every critter who moves, day or night.

Where should you look for tracks, and what should you look for? I suggest you start around your bird feeder. Birds leave very distinct tracks; you will find a variety of sizes and patterns of bird tracks in the snow under your feeder. By observing, you will soon learn which

are those of juncos, jays, cardinals, and you may even find the tracks of pheasants or wild turkeys there as well. Under the feeder you are very likely to find the signs of squirrel and rabbit, and in February, 'possum also.

Check closely around the foundation of your house, especially if you have shrubbery there. Here, mice, voles, and even shrews leave tracks that look like little railroad tracks in the snow as they forage and hunt at night.

In the fields and woods near your house, or in Beckman Mill County Park, you will find a variety of tracks which appear to be single holes in the snow in a straight line. All is not as it appears. Look carefully down into these tracks. At the bottom you will see pad and claw prints or cloven hoof prints. You can learn to differentiate among coyote, fox, dog,

and even cat tracks. You will also find that what you are seeing is the print of the hind foot over the front foot, making it look like each hole in the snow is but one foot print. Such is not the case. You will also learn to tell the direction of travel by closely inspecting the bottom of tracks in the deep snow.


You can learn a great deal about the habits of an animal by following its tracks for a long distance. A fox, for example, will visit every hole holding a hibernating skunk, will regularly mark the boundaries of its territory, and loves to get up higher by leaping up onto and walking along logs.

A mink or weasel will run along in the snow and then dive under it, coming up again several feet further on.

Wing marks in the snow mark the spot where an owl or hawk has caught its meal.

Developing your powers of observation while out in the winter will help you become a more aware member of the winter community. All you need to begin enjoying this fun winter hobby are some warm clothes (no such thing as bad weather, just bad clothes) and a good field guide to animal tracks. There are a number of them out there. I use *Field Guide to Tracking Animals in Snow* by Louise Richardson Forrest, and the Peterson *Field Guide to Animal Tracks*.

One of the most fun seasons of the year is upon us. Take up the hobby of "Tracking" and enjoy the snow!

Development Committee Report

As a non-profit organization that draws no government financial support, we rely heavily on philanthropy. That includes the volunteer time of individuals like you, who understand the benefits society derives from the services of the Welty Center and similar organizations, as we move inexorably into global dependencies and increasingly difficult environmental dilemmas. We need to succeed, and we need your help.

Generation of income to support Welty operations for 2011 has been relatively good, considering the national financial circumstances of the USA. The arenas in which we fall short are support from businesses and foundations. We're short-handed for making satisfactory improvement in support from these organizations.
