BECKMAN MILL PARK'S TRAIL SYSTEM EXPANDS!

A message from Joleen Stinson, Rock County Parks Community Coordinator

The existing savanna trail is expanding with a boardwalk across the wetland to an earth tread loop in the north woods of Beckman Mill Park. The trail system will also expand south adjacent to the savanna with a wheel chair accessible, limestone aggregate trail to the northwest corner of the Visitors Center. A second accessible limestone trail will begin at the southwest corner of the parking lot and run along the old farm lane to the north end of the mill. This trail will have spurs to the ramp on the Cooperage Museum and to the fishing pier. This project is possible through DNR grant funding.

The boardwalk construction was completed in mid-March. The earth tread loop in the northern part of

the park has been cut-in, but the ground is still rough. As soon as the ground dries, slight grading will smooth the trail. The limestone trail will be installed as soon as possible, temperature and weather dependent.

We hope you will explore the new trails this spring! Watch for an

announcement of the trail grand opening, which will be held in May.



Do you have fur items that have been passed down that you are uncomfortable with? Welty can use these items in programs relating to local animals, demonstrating such adaptations as camouflage, thick winter coats, and giving children who may have never seen a particular animal a chance to feel their fur and understand more about them. PHENOLOGY CORNER BY SANDY KALLAS, ROCK PRAIRIE MASTER GARDENER

Phenology is the study of the timing of recurring biological phenomena and their relationship to the weather. It is useful to gardeners, as a guide for when to plant. Weather can vary from year to year, but you can let the plants and animals tell you when it's time to start seeds. For instance:

- Plant your peas when the forsythia and daffodils bloom.
- Plant potatoes when the 1st dandelion blooms.

It's no guarantee that you won't lose a few plants to a late frost, but phenology is a good guideline to keep you in the ballpark. You can even use it to be pro-active against pests and invasive plants.

• Watch for garlic mustard plants appearing and blooming early in the spring. This is among the most aggressive of the invasive plants that you'll see. The speed with which it appears and blooms in the spring is worth observing, since it's among the reasons this plant is so successful in competing with native plants. The earliness and vigor of its growth is one reason it is able to shade out native plants and kill them. It also is extremely prolific in seed production.

In March and early April watch for the arrival of:

- Redwing blackbirds: Male
 Redwing blackbirds arrive first
 and begin putting on dramatic
 displays to mark out their
 territories.
- Sandhill cranes: Many times you can hear these beautiful birds without seeing them. They have a voice that carries very far. Listen for them when you are out at Welty.
- Butterflies: The first butterflies begin arriving in March.

In April watch for:

- Gypsy moth eggs hatching when the serviceberry flowers.
- tent caterpillar eggs hatching at the bud break of the flowering crab

Listen for: Spring peepers

Plant: Carrots, cole crops, lettuce, spinach when lilac is in first leaf.

Beets, peas, and onions when the daffodils bloom.

Potatoes when the serviceberry flowers.

Be watching for the following in May:

- Morels when the lilacs are blooming
- Wild geraniums blooming.

Plant: Annuals when there is new growth on burr oak, green ash, and grapes.

Peppers and eggplant outside when the bearded iris is blooming.

Corn when oak leaves are the size of a squirrel's ear.

Tomatoes and peppers when the dogwood is in peak bloom or when the daylilies start to bloom or lily-of-the-valley is in full bloom.

We probably all use Phenology or have been exposed to it without realizing it. Really, it is simply an equation. Like all equations it has two parts. First we notice what is going on around us and, with enough practice, we learn to watch for or do something else. By using Phenology we observe plants, animals and the weather and adjust our schedules accordingly.

TREE SALE
