Need an internship? Welty has you covered. Minimum number of hours is negotiable. Most complete roughly 26 to 30 hours total. If the internship is for school or college credit, you'll likely need 90 hours.

The Welty Ecology and Education Intern is primarily a learning position. The intern will learn how to assist the Welty Environmental Center based on their interests and the current need of the center. Some options include programming for camps, libraries, and the public, administration, social media and writing, accounting, curriculum design, graphic design, land stewardship, and animal ambassador care.

When do we need you? That's a great question! We are always looking for interns to help us, but especially in the summer (late May - early August).

What's in it for you? Mentorship, experience, references on request, a flexible schedule, and fun helping connect people to nature. As of right now, internship experiences are unpaid volunteer positions.
